There are no planned works on the London Underground or London Trams. However, TfL Rail, the DLR and London Overground will be affected by engineering and improvement works.

London Overground Part closure

Gospel Oak to Barking

Sunday: no service between Gospel Oak and Barking while Network Rail carries out work to enable new, longer trains to run from 2018.

Replacement bus services will run:

Service J: Gospel Oak (bus stops in Highgate Road, station not served until 9pm) - Upper Holloway - Crouch Hill (bus stops in Hornsey Road) - Finsbury Park (for the Piccadilly and Victoria lines) - Harringay Green Lanes - Seven Sisters (for South Tottenham and the Victoria line). Replacement buses won't run between Gospel Oak and Upper Holloway until 9pm owing to road closures - use bus route C11 instead.

Service T: Walthamstow Central (for the Victoria line) - Leyton Midland Road - Leytonstone High Road (bus stops at Harrow Green) - Wanstead Park - Woodgrange Park - East Ham (for the District and Hammersmith & City lines) - Barking.

At East Ham, eastbound buses set down only, westbound buses pick up only.

Use local buses between South Tottenham and Walthamstow Queen's Road or London Underground services between Seven Sisters and Walthamstow Central, and also between East Ham and Barking.

Highbury & Islington to New Cross/Clapham Junction/ Crystal Palace/West Croydon

Sunday: no service between New Cross Gate and Crystal Palace/West Croydon until 9.30am owing to Network Rail track work. Replacement buses will call at:

London Bridge - New Cross Gate - Brockley - Honor Oak Park - Forest Hill - Sydenham - Crystal Palace - Anerley (also for Penge West) - Norwood Junction - Selhurst - West Croydon.

Liverpool Street to Enfield Town/Cheshunt (via Seven Sisters)/Chingford

Sunday: Bethnal Green will not be served by trains to/from Chingford until midnight owing to Network Rail track work. Use Enfield Town/Cheshunt (via Seven Sisters) services.

DLR Station closure

Custom House: the station is closed until late December 2017.

Customers travelling to Custom House are advised to walk or use buses from nearby Prince Regent or Royal Victoria DLR stations, both of which are step-free.

TfL Rail Part closure

Sunday: no service between Liverpool Street and Stratford. This is while Network Rail carries out track and station improvements, as well as Crossrail construction work. Use the Central line instead.

See the Flying Scotsman in action

ONE of the world's most famous trains, the Flying Scotsman, will arrive at King's Cross St. Pancras station tomorrow after journeying through the capital.

Don't miss the chance to see it at various points along the route. It will pass through Alexandra Palace, Haringey and Finsbury Park before arriving at King's Cross St. Pancras at 2pm. It will then depart at 5.10pm for its return to Scarborough.

The best place to see the vintage steam train will be from bridges along the route.

The locomotive was built in Doncaster in 1953. It was named the Flying Scotsman after the London to Edinburgh rail service, which started in 1862.

Future of cross-London travel

THE first of the new Elizabeth line trains was welcomed into passenger service in east London and Essex yesterday.

Eleven of the modern, air-conditioned trains will be introduced on the TfL Rail route between Liverpool Street and Shenfield by autumn, and will form part of a fleet of 66 on the Elizabeth line which opens through central London next year.

The Mayor of London Sadiq Khan said: 'I'm delighted that our first state-of-the-art Elizabeth line train has entered service on the TfL Rail

service. It gives Londoners a first look at a new service that will transform travel across London and the south east when the line opens.

'The Crossrail programme remains on time and on budget, and the huge success of this project shows how vital it is for the whole of the country that we also push ahead with Crossrail 2.'

When fully open in 2019, the Elizabeth line will increase central London's rail capacity by ten per cent, carrying more than half a million passengers a day.
