



Getting around this Easter weekend

TfL is reminding customers to check online before they travel this Easter bank holiday.

MOST of the transport network is operating this weekend however TfL is using the quieter Easter period to carry out essential improvement work. The Victoria line will be closed on Easter Sunday and Monday, however replacement buses will be running. Upgrade works will also affect the Circle, District, Hammersmith & City and Metropolitan lines all weekend. Trains will not be running from Aldgate East to West Ham (District line), Liverpool Street to Barking (Hammersmith & City line), and there will be no service from Wembley Park

to Uxbridge and Northwood (Metropolitan line).

Although the Circle line will be partly closed (there is no service between Edgware Road and Hammersmith, Friday to Monday), stations will remain open as they will be served by other lines.

Whitechapel (District and Hammersmith & City lines) and Lancaster Gate (Central line) stations will be closed throughout the Easter weekend.

An alternative way to get around this Easter is by bus. There will be a

Saturday service on Good Friday and a Sunday service on Easter Monday, however buses will be running as usual at all other times.

There will be other closures and service changes on London Overground, trams, DLR, TfL Rail, National Rail, Dial-a-Ride and river services. There will also be some road closures, particularly affecting Wellesley Road in Croydon.

THE National Army Museum in Chelsea has reopened its doors to the public following a three-year redevelopment project.


Free to visit, the museum boasts five galleries laid out over four floors, a 500sq m temporary exhibition space, a learning centre, a café and a play area, where children under seven can learn through fun activities.

The best way to get to the museum is by public transport. Sloane Square Tube station (Circle and District lines) is a ten-minute walk away, Victoria Rail and Tube stations (Circle, District and Victoria lines) are a 20-minute walk and the 170 bus stops right outside.
