

Plan ahead for the weekend

London Overground

All weekend: No service between New Cross Gate and Crystal Palace/West Croydon. Use replacement or local bus services.

All weekend: No service between Gospel Oak and Barking. Use local bus or Tube services. Rail replacement bus service J will run between Gospel Oak and Seven Sisters, and rail replacement bus service T will run between Walthamstow Central and Barking.

Sunday: No service between Surrey Quays and Clapham Junction. Use alternative Tube or local bus services. Rail replacement bus service M will run between Canada Water and Clapham Junction.

Sunday: No service between Kilburn High Road and Euston before midday and after 8pm. Use alternative Tube or local bus services.

Sunday: No service between Hackney Downs and Chingford after 10.45pm. Use alternative Tube or local bus services. Rail replacement bus service L3 will run.



Reduced night services

THIS weekend, there is no Night Tube or Night Overground service, and limited Night Bus services. This includes tonight's night services.

Wembley Park lifts

UNTIL October 16, there will be no step-free access to the southbound Jubilee and Metropolitan lines at Wembley Park station. This is owing to lift maintenance work.

For the southbound Jubilee line, use lift 2 and take the northbound Jubilee line. Change at Kingsbury for southbound Jubilee line. To exit the southbound Jubilee line, continue to Kilburn and change for northbound Jubilee line services back to Wembley Park.

For the southbound Metropolitan line, use lift 2 and take the northbound Jubilee line. Change at Kingsbury for the southbound Jubilee line, then change at Wembley Park for southbound Metropolitan line services. To exit the southbound Metropolitan line, change at Wembley Park for southbound Jubilee line services to Kilburn. Change there for northbound Jubilee line services back to Wembley Park.



Staying safe when travelling

FACE coverings must be worn over your mouth and nose on public transport for the entire journey, unless you are exempt. This is to keep everyone safe. Carry hand sanitiser with you and wash your hands before and after you travel.

The quiet times on public transport are between 8.15am and 4pm and after 5.30pm on weekdays, and before midday and after 6pm on weekends.

WAR STORY

Here's something you really shouldn't miss. Internationally renowned artist and activist, Ai Weiwei, has taken over the Imperial War Museum's huge atrium with a new site-specific artwork, *History of the Bombs*.

Although the title focuses on conflict, the work itself considers international migration, conflict as a root cause of human flow and the relationship between the individual, society and the state, and it draws on the artist's ongoing investigation into politics and power. This is the first time the artwork has been presented in such a unique museum.

PRECIOUS METAL

As part of Westminster City Council's Inside Out Festival, Sofitel has launched *Silver Lining*, a major new art installation situated in and around the St James's area. This marks the first ever collaboration between artist duo Ania Catherine and Deija Ti, and poet Greta Bellamacina.

The commission, which brings to life Sofitel's 'joie de vivre' philosophy, sees numerous locations within St James's creatively re-imagined with shimmering ribbons of silver, interwoven with verse from Bellamacina's inspirational *Silver Lining* poem. The route includes Waterloo Place, St James's Market, Piccadilly Circus and Princes Arcade on Jermyn Street.
