

New rules to clean up taxi trade

FROM 2018, all taxis licensed for the first time must be zero-emission capable. This means there will be no new diesel taxis in London.

NEW private hire vehicles must follow suit from 2020.

The requirements were confirmed by the Mayor and TfL yesterday as they outlined how the taxi and private hire trades will play their part in improving London's air quality when the world's first Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) is launched in the capital in 2020.

Funding of £65million has been secured by the Mayor and TfL to help drivers adhere to the new rules. There is a target to get 9,000



zero-emission capable taxis on the streets of London by 2020.

Up to £5,000 will be available to taxi drivers who wish to decommission their vehicle once it reaches 10 years old, and a further £5,000

plug-in car grant is available through the Office for Low Emission Vehicles, with a possible £3,000 'top-up'. The same plug-in grants are also available for private hire drivers.

The scheme encourages cabbies to remove the oldest, most polluting vehicles from London's hire fleet and upgrade to new environmentally friendly taxis.

Mayor Boris Johnson said: 'The taxi and minicab trades have a crucial role to play in helping to improve London's air quality. We understand this will take time and that is why we are giving financial assistance to help clean up these vehicle fleets.'

'The Ultra Low Emission Zone is the most ambitious measure of its kind in the world and we need everyone on board for it to be a success.'

Before ULEZ requirements are introduced, private hire vehicles will also need to meet various standards to obtain a licence:

- New vehicles must be fitted with a Euro 6 petrol or diesel engine, or a Euro 4 petrol-hybrid engine between January 1 2018 and December 31 2019
- New vehicles under 18 months old must be zero emission capable from January 1 2020
- Older vehicles will need to be fitted with a Euro 6 engine if licensed for the first time between January 1 2020 and December 31 2022 – and be zero-emission capable from 2023
