# Night at the museum

## GET GLAMMED UP FOR A NIGHT ON THE TILES AT LONDON TRANSPORT MUSEUM

JOIN the museum at a special Friday Late event on February 28.

Visitors can discover London's rich nightlife history through a series of talks exploring everything from Victorian music halls and night-clubs, to subcultures that have influenced the world.

There will also be a chance to see the immersive Hidden London exhibition, giving you a glimpse of what lies beneath the streets in the capital's disused Underground stations and secret spaces.

These forgotten parts of the Tube network have fascinating stories to tell about Britain's wartime past, such as the Plessey factory. This was a secret underground aircraft factory that employed 2,000 members of staff – mostly women – to work in the two tunnels, each measuring 4km, on the eastern section of the Central line during World War II.

As well as exploring the museum's galleries after hours, you can get your craft on with creative workshops, join talks and exhibition

tours, and dance to music from the resident DJ to help get you in the party mood.

The Night on the Tiles Friday Late event takes place at the museum in Covent Garden. It starts at 6.45pm and runs until 10pm. Tickets cost £15 (£12 for concessions).
