

On your marks, get set, go!

Prudential RideLondon, the world's greatest festival of cycling, is coming to the capital this weekend.

NOW in its fifth year, it starts on Friday at Lee Valley VeloPark with the Prudential Ride London Grand Prix, featuring BMX, youth road racing and handcycling. Entry is free and alongside the racing, there are Festival Zones packed with bike-based entertainment.

FreeCycle will see eight miles of London's roads closed to vehicles on Saturday, offering riders of all ages and abilities the experience of cycling on traffic-free streets.

Riders and spectators can enjoy seven Festival Zones, which offer the chance to try a range of activities including a cycle cinema and a pedal-powered quiz. To encourage as many people to take part as possible, there will be led rides from every London borough to take cyclists to the heart

of the action.

On Saturday evening some of the world's best women cyclists compete in the Prudential RideLondon Classique around a central London circuit, ending on the Mall.

The weekend finishes on Sunday when the roads of London and Surrey will fill with thousands of amateur cyclists as they set out from Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, through the capital, to the Surrey countryside before returning to the Mall.

The event will be followed by the professional cyclists who will take part in the Prudential RideLondon-Surrey-Classic.

King's Cross St. Pancras lift update

SOME lift replacement work at King's Cross St. Pancras has been completed three weeks earlier than scheduled.

Passengers are now able to use the lifts between the ticket hall and the Circle, Hammersmith & City and Metropolitan line platforms.

TfL has been working to replace the lift since March

as part of its programme to renew and upgrade lifts and escalators across the network.

A separate lift at the station which is located between the same ticket hall and the entrance to St. Pancras International is also being replaced and should be back in service by late August.

Nine Elms Closes August 20

TfL wants to improve safety and facilities for cyclists and pedestrians in Nine Elms Lane and Battersea Park Road.

Camden Town Closes August 18

TfL wants to hear your views on its plans to improve capacity at Camden Town station and provide step-free access from the street to trains.
