On the evening of June 6, TfL and Jupiter London Nocturne will host a 15-minute race on the cycle hire bikes. Participants will join some famous faces to race the 1.1km route, pedalling as fast as they can around the iconic Smithfield Market.

The Jupiter London Nocturne, now in its ninth year, is a series of sprint and endurance cycling events and free festival in east London. Attended by more than 15,000 spectators, it boasts a buzzing atmosphere, with a cycling expo area, food stalls, live music and the Santander

Cycles roadshow, where people can pick up a free docking station map and ask staff about the cycle hire scheme.

James Mead, general manager of Santander Cycles at TfL, said: 'Last year's race was one of the standout events of the night. While only a handful of people will be lucky enough to compete in the race, anyone can hire one of our Santander Cycles from one of 750 docking stations across central London. I'm sure, like last year, this race will encourage even more people to use the scheme to ride around London for commuting or leisure.'
