

# Have a ramble down Regent Street



London's Regent Street will be transformed into a spectacular display of transport designs on Sunday for the free Transported by Design Festival.

THE event will run from midday until 6pm and celebrates the designs that have kept the city on the move from Victorian times to the present. It will also give an exciting sneak peek into the future of travel.

Visitors will be able to see a horse-drawn bus plus a selection of heritage buses, and take a look at a 1927 Tube train carriage. There will also be a selection of classic advertising posters that used to adorn the walls of the Underground.

Move on to the present day with a host of designs from the 20th century, including a 'Cycle Spin Fun' zone, hosted by Santander Cycles. Visitors can see a selection of the fabric used across the transport network in 'Moquette Land', while the 'Design a bus' competition will keep children entertained. There is also a chance to take a look at the design behind contactless payment.

Finally, step into the 'London 2040' future zone to see, hear, and feel what transport could be like in the coming decades. Experience a sensory cinema, try virtual reality headsets, and come along to some short 'TED'-style talks on 'Transport in the Digital Age'.

There will be a number of free family activities and games, as well as food and drink on offer.

The festival is presented by TfL and London Transport Museum, and supported by Exterior Media.

## Bus injury numbers down



FEWER people have been injured in incidents involving buses during the first three months of this year compared with the previous quarter.

Bus safety statistics, published by TfL this week, show that 1,399 people were hurt compared with 1,488 between September and December, representing a drop of six per cent.

The figures come as TfL confirms details of its Bus Safety Programme, which will see the introduction of the latest safety technology to help London's buses avoid and lessen the impact of collisions, enhanced new training for all its 24,700 drivers, and safety incentives for bus operators.
