TRAVEL ADVICE FOR PASSENGERS ON JUBILEE LINE

PLANNED strike action by the ASLEF and RMT unions tomorrow will impact customers who travel on the Jubilee line.

If the strike goes ahead, there will be no service on the Jubilee line all day. All other TfL services will run as normal.

Customers are advised to use alternative routes where possible and allow more time than usual to complete their journeys.

TfL Travel Ambassadors will be at key locations to provide travel

information and advice to help customers.

The strike that was scheduled to take place on the District line has been suspended.

Changes at Bank

IT is now easier and faster for passengers to leave Bank station during the morning rush hour.

On weekdays, the escalators serving the Bank station end of the Northern and DLR platforms now run upwards only between the times of 7.30am and 10am.

This reduces the queues as customers exit the platforms and also cuts the journey time for commuters. Anyone wishing to access these platforms can do so via the stairs, or by using the lifts from the Northern line ticket hall.

Step-free access to and from the DLR platforms is available as usual via the lift in King William Street.

That's the ticket!

RAILWAY enthusiast Dean Curtis is collecting old rail tickets to cement his place in the Guinness Book of Records as the holder of the most used rail tickets.

Dean's efforts were given a boost recently when staff at Bond Street station donated 4,000 tickets, bringing his total to 178,810.

London Underground staff from Uxbridge, Bond Street, Waterloo and London Bridge stations are also helping out by keeping tickets for him.

Dean claims he is 15,575 ahead of his nearest rival – a collector in Germany – and is just waiting for an inspector from the famous world record organisation to visit his Uxbridge home to verify the count and his title.

He said: 'Railways are my thing and I just love everything about them. The Tube is my favourite and station staff have always been very

good about helping me boost my collection. I've got all my tickets counted and categorised too.'
