

Get your career on track

Londoners will be encouraged to consider a career in the rail industry from Monday as part of the nationwide Rail Week.

STAFF at London Overground will host a series of free events across the network aimed at inspiring the next generation.

The events will celebrate the diverse opportunities available on the Overground and across the railway industry. They include train



depot tours, a 'meet the driver' event, as well as school visits and work experience.

opportunity to get a first-hand experience of life as a driver on the London Overground train simulator.

The tours take place this Friday and Saturday, and again on July 2. To apply for a place, email stakeholder@lorol.co.uk.

There will be a chance to put questions to a driver at Norwood Junction station on Thursday June 30. Driver Samantha Butler, who has worked in the industry for 11 years, will share her experiences.

'As a driver on the London Overground I know first-hand what a great place the railway industry is to work,' says Samantha. 'My colleagues and I want to share this knowledge and inspire people, particularly young women, living around our network to consider a career in rail.'

London Overground staff will also be visiting schools near to the Overground network to talk about what it's like to work in the rail industry and highlight the opportunities.

Students from the William Ellis Boys School will also be undertaking a work experience placement at the London Overground as part of Rail Week.

Road closed westbound at the junction of Waterloo Place for the Modball event. Buses will be diverted.

A street designed to thrill

REGENT Street is being turned into a one day festival of transport design on Sunday July 3.

The free Transported by Design day will see the whole of Regent Street closed from Piccadilly Circus to Oxford Street Tube stations as the city celebrates the public transport that has kept London moving from the past to the present and future.
