



There is now a choice of four ways: by Blackwell Farm and over the ridge to Chesham (a further three miles), or by routes of varying length to Chalfont and Latimer Station (see walks 14b, 14c).

For Chesham, follow the lane across the Chess, keep by the wall of Blackwell Hall, and turn left at the end of it by a swing-gate. Follow the path over three meadows to the main road by Broadwater Bridge, where the Chess flows beside the highway. A few yards along the road, turn right through the fieldgate of Milk Hall Farm; bear over to a gate opposite, and continue by Bolton Lane, which is a mere cartway on a bank. Half a mile on, just beyond a left and a right bend, is a stile where the path from Latimer comes down the hillside on the right ($3\frac{3}{4}$ miles). Turn left here up the opposite hill and follow walk 116 to Chesham.

Walk 14b

TO LATIMER, CHENIES, AND BACK TO CHALFONT STATION ($5\frac{1}{4}$ miles).

Turn right in the Chesham road. The old Bois Mill (not working) is on the Chess, 500 yards down the road. A little farther on, the LATIMER parkland can be seen across the stream until a screen of trees blocks the view. On reaching the right-hand wood, carry on just short of a red-brick house, then take the road that runs up through the remains of Lane Wood, only recently cleared. Keep to this road for a good quarter of a mile to a point about 100 yards before it curves right. Here take the path on the left (1 mile) which runs as a broad ride for half a mile to a cross-road. All the beeches have been felled, but as consolation there is the view over the valley, marked only by the huts that have sprung up on the open hillside adjoining Latimer House. Continue for about 600 yards until a white sun-house is reached. To the right is Chenies Avenue, which leads to Chalfont and Latimer Station, half a mile ahead.
