Central line services return to Bond Street

PASSENGERS can once again take the Central line to Bond Street, following a temporary platform closure to enable the construction of new passageways and a lift shaft.

The station is undergoing a massive redevelopment to increase capacity and improve accessibility by 2017, and to create an interchange with Crossrail.

Once improvements are complete, benefits will include:

- A new entrance on Marylebone Lane, on the north side of Oxford Street, leading to a new ticket hall
- New escalators serving the Jubilee line
- Lifts providing step-free access from street to platform
- An interchange with Crossrail services within the station

Service changes in June

Both the Jubilee and Central lines will serve the station until Friday June 27. During the weekend of June 28-29 there will be a Jubilee line closure between Waterloo and Finchley Road, and from Monday



June 30 until early December, Jubilee line trains will not stop at Bond Street. This is to allow further capacity and accessibility improvements at the station.

Bond Street facts

- It is situated in the heart of London's West End, the busiest shopping district in the UK – serving tourists, residents and businesses.
- More than 155,000 passengers use the station each day
- When Crossrail arrives in 2018, passenger numbers are expected to increase to 225,000

New art at Gloucester Road

FROM today, commuters can enjoy a new work of art at Gloucester Road Tube station. The Art on the Underground commission features a 62-metre, panoramic photograph across the length of the station's disused platform. An English Landscape (American Surveillance Base near Harrogate, Yorkshire) by US photographer Trevor Paglen, presents a view of the North Yorkshire landscape punctuated with the distinctive white domes used by the US in military communications.

Louise Coysh, Art on the Underground manager, said: 'Art on the Underground is delighted to bring an artist of Trevor Paglen's standing and



importance to our flagship site. I've no doubt this work will stimulate thought and debate during the rush hour commute.'

Art on the Underground's Gloucester Road site gives invited

artists the opportunity to create ambitious, temporary new work at the site that will be viewed by more than a million visitors each month.
