

On turning left, with one's back to Chenies Avenue, two forward paths are seen. Take the left-hand one, and drop down to a stile and on alongside a field to a gate. Pass through this, and carry on along the road to the cross roads. Turn left into Latimer (2½ miles).

Turning right at Latimer post-office (as one faces it), cross the stile facing the 'School' sign, and keep forward through the fields, past the ruined church and the tomb. Continue by a hedgerow track and through Mill Farm into the lane (¾ miles). Turn right here over the Chess at Chenies Mill, and right again into the main road. Cross the main road, and go through a gate immediately opposite. Continue up through the copse by the left-hand path, looking back for an exquisite view of the valley below Chenies. Carry on through another gate, along the mossy Monk's Walk, and so out by Chenies church and the Great House. To the left is the tidy, elm-set green and its homely cottages. To the right is the Bedford Arms.

For a return to Chalfont and Latimer Station, make for the other side of the little cemetery that faces the church by passing round by the school. Crossing the stile, bear half-right over the field—past Queen Elizabeth's Oak. Turn right in the cartway, and carry on beside the Great House Farm to a stile. Cross this and drop down for a few yards to a cross-track. Turn left by the track, through a copse, out on to the open ridge. Continue forward by the elms of Lady Cheney's Walk, *straight ahead* through the woods (from one gate, for 80 yards by road, to another), and so to the white sun-house again. Chenies Avenue runs from here to the Station (¾ miles).

Walk 14c

TO FLAUNDEN AND BACK (2½ miles).

This extension of Walk 14b makes the tour from Chalfont and Latimer Station about 10 miles in all.

On entering Latimer, bear left (as one faces the post office) and follow the lane for about half a mile. This

grassy valley marks the Bucks-Herts border. After reaching the first left-hand lane, carry on for another 70 yards, to a path from a 5-bar gate on the right. This path runs beside the road at first. It then slants up the slope, skirts a copse, and veers to the left over to the road, which here is on the ridge. Continue forward from the gate, and so round the bend into Flaunden. Passing the red-brick church, the Green Dragon is to the left, and Heath's Lane is in the right-hand corner (by the School House). From a field-gate here there is an unusual view along the grassy slopes of the valley to the ridge of Chenies, crowned by the lofty elms of LADY CHENEY'S WALK.

Leaving Flaunden, take to Heath's Lane, and at the fork 750 yards on take the *forward* 5-bar gate and follow beside the left-hand hedge to an iron stile on the left. Cross the stile, slant half-left over the field to the farmway at Martin's Top, where in the hunting-season one will occasionally meet the Old Berkeley. Cross the farmway and carry on to a stile at the corner of Baldwin's Wood, and so straight down beside the wood, with views of the valley below Chenies. This leads out to the road at Mill Farm. From here the way back to the Station is the same as in Walk 14b.
