

Will your journey be affected this weekend?

There are no planned works on the Bakerloo, Central, Circle, District, Hammersmith & City, Metropolitan, Northern, Piccadilly, Victoria or Waterloo & City lines, Docklands Light Railway or London Tramlink. However, the following lines will be affected by engineering and improvement works.

Jubilee line

Part closure

Sunday: No service between Waterloo and Finchley Road until 11am owing to tunnel lining work. Use alternative Tube and/or bus services.

London Overground

Part closure

Sunday: No service between Sydenham and West Croydon until 9.30am owing to Network Rail track work. Tickets will be accepted on local buses via all reasonable routes and replacement buses will run.

Sunday: No service between Surrey Quays and Clapham Junction owing to Network Rail track work. Replacement buses will run.

Sunday: No service between Willesden Junction and Camden Road via West Hampstead owing to work to prepare the network for five-car trains. Replacement buses will run. Trains will run to an amended timetable along an alternative route between Willesden Junction and Stratford.

More Victoria line trains

PASSENGERS on the Victoria line are now benefitting from the most frequent train service in the UK – up to 34 trains an hour at peak times.

This means there is now less than two minutes between trains during the morning and evening rush hours.

More trains are running the full length of the line from Brixton to Walthamstow Central to cater for a growing demand at the north end of the line.

The weekend influx of shoppers, tourists and regular travellers also benefit from increased services on Saturday afternoons, with a train every two and a quarter minutes. On Sundays, customers will have a train every two and half minutes from 9am until 10pm.

Wireless Festival at Finsbury Park

UP to 135,000 festival-goers are expected in Finsbury Park for concerts this evening, tomorrow and Sunday night.

The nearest Tube stations are Finsbury Park and Manor House, which will be busier than normal with queuing systems in place from 10.00pm. Passengers will find it easier to change between Tube and First Capital Connect services at King's Cross St. Pancras.

Temporary road closures and bus diversions will be in place on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings.

Cycle paths through Finsbury Park will be closed during the event and there are no Barclays Cycle Hire docking stations in the area.

If you are going to the British Summer Time festival tonight, Saturday or Sunday, avoid Hyde Park Corner station as it's likely to be extremely busy. If possible, use nearby Green Park station instead.



Travel information for the Tour de France

THE Tour de France – the world's largest annual sporting event – comes to London on Monday after two stages in Yorkshire.

Around 200 elite cyclists will travel from Cambridge, through Essex and into London before a spectacular finish on The Mall.

On Monday, road closures for the event through north, east, and central London will begin after the morning peak at 10am, with roads reopening as quickly as possible once the Tour has passed through and it is safe to do so. Roads are expected to have reopened by 6pm.

Closures will affect the boroughs of Redbridge, Waltham Forest, Hackney, Newham, Tower Hamlets, City, Westminster, Lambeth and Southwark.

Tower, Southwark and Westminster Bridges will be closed for much of the day, however there are no planned closures on any other major river crossings in central London.

Maps showing the areas inside the M25 that will be affected by the race are available at tfl.gov.uk/tourdefrance, together with travel advice.

Pedestrians will be able to cross the route at key crossing points and TfL is working with local businesses close to the route to ensure that disruption is kept to a minimum. Tube and rail services will be the best way to get

around and enjoy the day. Stations along the route, and particularly in Zone 1, are expected to be busy from midday until around 6pm.

To avoid delays, drivers are advised to, wherever possible, avoid areas near the event routes in the affected parts of Cambridgeshire, Essex and London.

Garrett Emmerson, chief operating officer of Surface Transport at TfL, said: 'We've been working long and hard to plan for the return of the Tour to the capital and now we are asking Londoners to start their planning too.'

'London will be open for business as usual and we will help by keeping the capital moving, however, roads around the race route will be extremely busy, so we're asking people to plan ahead and preferably use public transport to make the most of what I'm sure will be an amazing day, helping to further cement London's growing reputation as a major cycling city.'
