

Have your say on Crossrail 2 route

A CONSULTATION on the proposed Crossrail 2 routes has been launched by Transport for London and Network Rail.

The high-frequency, high-capacity line could run between South-West and North-East London. It could shorten journey times, help relieve congestion on the busy transport network and provide a catalyst for new jobs and homes.

The route for Crossrail 2, previously known as the 'Chelsea-Hackney' line, has been kept free from major building development since 1991. This route is now being reviewed and Transport for London has proposed two alternatives which could better meet the rail needs



of the capital in the future - a 'metro' and a 'regional' option:

- Metro could provide a high-frequency underground railway through central

London and between Wimbledon and Alexandra Palace, relieving congestion on the Piccadilly and Victoria lines

- Regional could benefit people as far as Hertfordshire and Surrey and enable more trains to run on busy National Rail routes. It could combine underground and overground railways, and could run from Alexandra Palace and stations in Hertfordshire to various locations in South-West London and Surrey

Mayor of London Boris Johnson (pictured above at yesterday's launch) said: 'Crossrail is set to revolutionise travel in the capital and, with a predicted 10 million people expected to be living in London by 2031, pressing

Journey to Metro-land to see historic Tube trains

THE sights and sounds of the world's first underground railway will be recreated over the next couple of weekends as part of the Tube's 150th birthday celebrations.

A series of special train rides organised by London Transport Museum will take place on the Metro-land section of the Metropolitan line in North-West London. The Metro-land name was coined in 1915 by the Metropolitan Railway's publicity department, which set up a company to develop housing and shops along the line as it expanded out of the capital.

This Sunday the Art Deco special - a Tube train from the 1930s - will run alongside an original A-stock unit, offering trips to the heart of Metro-land from Amersham and Harrow-on-the-Hill as part of the Rickmansworth Festival. London Transport Museum Friends are providing a free heritage bus service between Rickmansworth station and Batchworth Lock where the festival is taking place.

Then, from May 25-27, the newly restored Metropolitan Steam Locomotive No.1, the last one to be built by the Metropolitan Railway, will be pulling historic coaches on a round trip from Amersham via Harrow-on-the-Hill.
