



A train every 100 seconds

Commuters using the Victoria line now have one of the fastest Tube services in the world.

LONDON Underground (LU) has introduced a new timetable on the Victoria line that gives rush hour passengers a train every 100 seconds.

A total of 36 trains an hour will now run on the entire line during peak times.

By increasing the service, an extra 3,000 passengers can be carried every hour on the Victoria line during the busiest times of the day.

LU managing director, Mark Wild, said: 'We're running more trains than ever before and this will make a real difference to our customers, creating more capacity and making stations and train services less crowded.'

'We're also making more of our stations step-free as part of our huge investment in making London Underground more accessible.'

Director of Operations at Siemens Rail Automation, Rob Morris, said: 'Following our work on the initial Victoria line upgrade project which was completed in 2012, we are delighted to have completed the programme and to have contributed to its safe delivery.'

Victoria station upgrade on track

WORK to upgrade the Victoria line and Tube station, ready to meet passenger demands in the future, is almost finished.

The newly renovated north ticket hall opened in January, providing a new entrance in Victoria Street which opens directly onto the Cardinal Place shopping area.

By next year the station will also have step-free access to all lines, a larger south ticket hall, improved interchange for people switching trains and a further nine new escalators.
