There are no planned works on the Bakerloo, Central, Hammersmith & City, Jubilee, Metropolitan, Northern, Piccadilly, Victoria or Waterloo & City lines, London Trams or TfL Rail. However, the following lines will be affected by engineering and improvement works.

### Circle line

### Part closure

**All weekend:** no service between Edgware Road and Aldgate (via Victoria) owing to points renewal work at High Street Kensington and bridge works at Paddington. Use alternative bus and/or Tube services.

### District line

### Part closure

**All weekend:** no service between Earl's Court and Edgware Road/Kensington (Olympia) owing to points renewal work at High Street Kensington and bridge works at Paddington. Replacement buses will run from 8am to 7pm between Earl's Court and Kensington (Olympia).

### Docklands Light Railway

### Part closure

**All weekend:** no service between Stratford and Poplar owing to track work. Replacement buses will run between Canary Wharf and Stratford.

### London Overground

### Part closure

**All weekend:** no service between Gospel Oak and Barking while the line is prepared for electrification. Replacement buses will run between Gospel Oak and Seven Sisters (for South Tottenham), and between Walthamstow Central and Barking.

**All weekend:** no service between Clapham Junction and Kensington (Olympia) owing to work at Earls Court. Use local buses via all reasonable routes.

**Sunday:** no service until 8.30am between New Cross Gate and West Croydon/Crystal Palace owing to Network Rail bridge work. Use local buses via all reasonable routes.

**Monday May 9 to Thursday May 12:** no service after 10.15pm each evening between Sydenham and West Croydon owing to Network Rail track work. Use local buses via all reasonable routes. Go to [tfl.gov.uk](https://tfl.gov.uk) for full details.

## Thousands expected for Hackney Half Marathon

THE streets of East London will be lined with people this weekend to cheer on the runners of the Vitality Run Hackney Half Marathon.

The race takes place between 9am and 1.30pm on Sunday May 8. Crowds of 25,000 are expected for the charity event, which starts and finishes at Hackney Marshes.

Road closures will be in place from 7am until 2pm and drivers are advised to allow extra time for their journey and use alternative routes where possible.

The A10 to the west of the route or the A12 to the east are unlikely to be affected.

Twenty-two bus routes in the area will stop before their destination or be diverted so passengers are advised to plan ahead. Stratford Tube station will be busier than usual as people make their way to the race.

## A sight for tour eyes

LONDON Transport Museum Depot in Acton is running a number of tours this summer, allowing visitors to explore behind the scenes of the capital's transport network.

Design enthusiasts can discover more about Edward Johnston in a specially-created tour to mark the 100th anniversary of the iconic typeface named after him.

Learn how this expert in medieval calligraphy devised the now famous font and iconic 'roundel' logo in 1916, which has transformed the way customers use the network and is an instantly recognisable symbol of London.

Another option is the Depot Discovery tour, which gives audiences the chance to enjoy vintage rail and road vehicles, signalling and tunnelling equipment, and a range of quirky objects in the huge collection.

Families can have a day out with the Depot Explorer tours, which allow parents and children to see the Underground train that was once driven by the Queen, as well as board a 75-year-old Tube train.
