## Speeding up journeys at Holborn

A THREE-week testing period is under way at Holborn that aims to ease congestion at the station.

During the morning peak, between 8.30am and 9.30am, long queues build up as around 13,000 passengers exit the station. The second week of tests kicked off yesterday, which is seeing staff encourage people to stand on both

sides of the escalators as they go up. Early indications show that this is helping to reduce queues. CCTV footage and ticket gate data are being monitored to evaluate the success of the tests.
