

Lost property gets gift-wrapped



Hundreds of toys and games left behind on London's transport network are being distributed to disadvantaged children in the capital this Christmas.

MANY of the items, from puzzles and board games to dolls, cars and teddies, are new and were found abandoned on buses, trains and across the TfL network. All efforts to find their owners have failed, and they have remained unclaimed for more than three months.

Now TfL's Lost Property Office is donating them to the Salvation Army's Christmas Present Appeal, where they will be wrapped and given to families in need.

It's the eleventh year running that TfL has supported the appeal, which it describes as a very worthy cause.

Manager of the Lost Property Office, Paul Cowan, said: 'Each year, we are left with thousands of unclaimed items. As many of them are new and

unused, they make perfect gifts to donate to children and their families during the festive season, bringing a smile to their faces.'

The Salvation Army works with local councils and care services in south London to distribute the gifts and ensure the toys get to where they are most needed.

Unclaimed items

Lost property that cannot be matched with an enquiry, or remains unclaimed after three months, becomes the property of TfL.

Any personal data is removed and securely destroyed.

Items are then donated to charities, such as The Salvation Army, The British Red Cross and Scope, or are

recycled, sold or disposed of.

Any revenue generated from unclaimed items goes towards the cost of running the Lost Property Office.


Don't forget your bags
