IF you're looking for things to do this summer, London Transport Museum has a host of family-friendly activities on offer.

Children can take part in make-and-take craft workshops, storytelling sessions and follow a free trail inspired by the museum's latest exhibition 'Goodbye Piccadilly – from Home Front to Western Front'. There's also the chance to play on real buses and trains, as well as having a go at being a Tube driver on the museum's simulator.

The adventures of Constance the Clippie

Children can learn about the adventures of Constance the



'conductorette' as she teaches her clever tricks for catching cheats who try to dodge paying their fares.

Children from four to 12 can also make a stash of clay coins and stitch a secret pouch in which to hide them.

From today until August 1, and August 18 to 22, various times from 11am to 3.45pm.

Pigeon Post

Help the wartime code-carrying pigeons reunite in this interactive session for children aged between three and seven. Children aged six

and older can write their own secret messages and make a carrier pigeon to take home.

August 4 to 8, and August 25 to 29, various times from 11am to 3.45pm.

Be Safe Week

This week features an undercover circuit where young visitors can dash between different transport safety scenarios as they solve clues and learn from the professionals.

They will also be able to get their fingerprints taken and learn how the police gather evidence. Each young person that completes the circuit goes into a draw for the chance to win a number of prizes from the museum shop.
