Not joining the world in Windsor this weekend? Visit one of these locations instead to enter into the spirit without braving the crowds.

ST JAMES'S MARKET

Settle down in style to watch Meghan marry Harry, at a free outdoor screening in St James's Market near Piccadilly. With deckchairs to relax in and themed decorations, there's sure to be a festive atmosphere.

How to get there: St James's Market is a three-minute walk from Piccadilly Circus (Bakerloo and Piccadilly lines) and a five-minute walk from Green Park (Jubilee, Piccadilly and Victoria lines) and Charing Cross (Bakerloo and Northern lines, and National Rail).

CHELSEA PHYSIC GARDEN

Entrance to the garden is free from 11am until 6pm on Saturday in honour of the special occasion. Visitors can watch the ceremony on an outdoor screen, explore a themed mystery trail and enter the best hat competition, all while sipping on a 'Minty Markle' cocktail. Cheers!

How to get there: The nearest Tube station is Sloane Square (Circle and District lines). Bus route 170 stops directly outside the garden.

KENSINGTON PALACE AND GARDENS

Not keen on the big screen? Take a relaxed stroll instead, in surroundings fit for royalty. Currently home to Harry and Meghan – as well as to Prince William, Kate Middleton and their children – Kensington Palace has belonged to the Royal Family since the 17th century. It's nestled in the beautiful Kensington Gardens: the perfect place to unwind in style.

How to get there: Kensington Gardens are a ten to 15-minute walk from High Street Kensington (Circle and District lines) or Queensway (Central line). Several bus routes run nearby.

Advice for heading to the wedding

Visitors travelling to Windsor for the royal wedding on Saturday are encouraged to plan ahead and leave plenty of time for their journey.

Spectators should arrive early to find a good space to stand, as the town will be very busy with large crowds lining the procession route.

If you are planning to drive, you can book one of 6,000 pre-paid car parking spaces in advance by visiting www.windsor.gov.uk

TRAVEL TIPS

GWR and South Western Railway services are likely to be extremely busy.

There will be queuing systems in place at key stations and interchanges including Paddington and Waterloo.
