

Art in the Park

Regent's Park will be transformed into an outdoor gallery with an exhibition of sculptures from some of the world's leading artists.

VISITORS to the English Gardens, in the east of the park near Chester Gate, will be able to enjoy a Sculpture Park with works by



renowned sculptors, including 20th century masters and new commissions by contemporary artists.

The Sculpture Park, organised as part of Frieze London, which showcases art from the world's leading galleries, will be open from Wednesday until January 8 and will be free to enter.

The collection features 20 works from the likes of Ed Herring, Claes Oldenburg and Eduardo Paolozzi, who created a number of works across London's transport network, including the mosaics at Tottenham Court Road station.



From Wednesday, visitors can download the free Sculpture Guide app, developed by charity Art Fund. The app will feature detailed information on each of the sculptures as well as an audio guide.


The charity is also producing a programme of workshops to run during the outdoor exhibition. Robert Dingle, contemporary projects manager at Art Fund, said: 'To have a free sculpture exhibition, right in the heart of London, is fantastic and staying open long after Frieze London have closed will mean everyone will have even more time to visit.'

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Sculpture in London

THERE is plenty of outdoor art to enjoy across the capital. Here are some of the best picks:

Single Form by Barbara Hepworth Battersea Park

Sitting on the south shore of the lake in the park, this 10ft bronze statue was created as a memorial to a friend of Hepworth who died in an air crash in 1961.

Nearest station: Battersea Park (London Overground)

Large Spindle Piece by Henry Moore King's Cross

The three-metre tall bronze has been loaned to Network Rail to display in King's Cross Square as part of the redevelopment of the station.

Nearest station: King's Cross St. Pancras (Victoria, Northern, Piccadilly, Hammersmith & City, Circle and Metropolitan lines)



Newton by Eduardo Paolozzi British Museum

The 12ft-high bronze statue (above), based on a watercolour by William Blake, greets visitors to the British Museum.

Nearest station: King's Cross St. Pancras (Victoria, Northern, Piccadilly, Hammersmith & City, Circle and Metropolitan lines)

Quantum Cloud by Anthony Gormley Greenwich Peninsula

This 30m-high structure made of randomly positioned steel sections, which stands in the Thames next to The O2, was the tallest statue in the UK when it was constructed in 1999.

Nearest station: North Greenwich (Jubilee line)

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
