There are no planned works on the Bakerloo, Central, Circle, District, Hammersmith & City, Metropolitan, Piccadilly, Victoria or Waterloo & City lines, Docklands Light Railway or London Tramlink. However, the following lines will be affected by engineering and improvement works.

Jubilee line

Part closure

Sunday: No service between Waterloo and Finchley Road until 11am owing to line tunnelling work. Use alternative Tube or bus services.

Northern line

Part closure

All weekend: No service between Archway and High Barnet/Mill Hill East owing to track replacement in the Finchley Central area. Replacement bus services will run:

Service A: Archway – Highgate – East Finchley – Finchley Central – West Finchley – Woodside Park – Totteridge & Whetstone – High Barnet

Service B: Finchley Central – Mill Hill East

London Overground

Part closure

Sunday: No service between Willesden Junction and Camden Road until 11.15am owing to Network Rail track work. Tickets will be accepted on local bus and Tube services via all reasonable routes (for entrance/exit only at Willesden Junction, Kilburn, West Hampstead, Finchley Road, Highbury & Islington and Caledonian Road stations).

Sunday: No service between Shepherd's Bush and Willesden Junction until 11.15am owing to Network Rail track work. Valid rail tickets will be accepted on local buses via all reasonable routes.

Sunday: No service between Richmond and Willesden Junction owing to Network Rail track work. Use the District line between Richmond and Gunnersbury. Replacement buses will call at: Gunnersbury – South Acton – Acton Central – Willesden Junction.

Sunday: No northbound service from Clapham Junction to Wandsworth Road until 8.15am owing to Network Rail track work. The 7.20am and 7.50am trains from Clapham Junction to Highbury & Islington will run an alternative route, starting from Battersea Park (at 7.22am and 7.52am), calling at Wandsworth Road and then all stations to Highbury & Islington. Tickets will be accepted on local buses between Clapham Junction and Battersea Park/Surrey Quays via all reasonable routes, and on Southern services between Battersea Park and Clapham Junction.

Southbound London Overground services will not be affected.
